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# 21<sup>st</sup> Annual IFAMA World Forum and Symposium: The Road to 2050 Sustainability as a Business Opportunity

### Introduction

The present report describes the attendance to 21st Annual IFAMA World Forum and Symposium held in Frankfurt, Germany from June 20 to 23 of 2011. The process of attending the conference started on November of 2010 when I first submitted the abstract for oral presentation. In January, the IFAMA replayed to me that the topic has been accepted for oral presentation award" which was established to recognize research which distinctively rises above the criteria set in the call for papers. To enter the best paper competition, a manuscript must first be accepted to present at the Symposium. Since, I was already accepted to have oral presentation in the Symposium, in February of 2011 submit a complete manuscript which underwent a comprehensive, "fast track" double-blind peer review. A total of 41 papers were submitted to the top ten best paper finalists. In April, I receive a decision letter from IFAMA that my topic was one of the top ten finalists. As a top 10 best paper finalists, authors will be recognize in the IFAMA's bi-monthly newsletter the ChainLetter, during the Symposium and invited to publish their manuscript in the Special Symposium Edition of the International Food and Agribusiness Management Review (IFAMR official journal).

Also a top 10 best paper finalist will be invited to present the paper in a final round of competition held during the Frankfurt Symposium June 20 to 23. Finalists had the opportunity to male final revisions to their manuscript based on the review feedback. Judges would consider both the quality of the manuscript and the oral presentation. The description of the final competition comprises the rest of this report for which I had to travel to Frankfurt-Germany.

# IFAMA 21<sup>st</sup> World Forum and Symposium Program:

The program of this scientific event was as follow. World Symposium, June 20-21: it included 154 oral presentation divided in 81 sections. Poster display, June 20-23, was also one important event. Students case completion June 19 and June 21. World forum, June 22-23, this event had 16 topics with more than 40 distinguish expertise. The forum had distinguished guest speakers from the bank, agribusiness, NGOs, and academia sector. Some of the speakers were Syngenta's CEO Michael Mack; DWS (Deutsche Bank) Thomas Rueschen; FROSTA's CEO Felix Ahlers among other speakers. The Presidential Banquet (for all the participants) was on June 22. Finally the Forum wrap-up and presidential transition took place on the last day, June 23.

# My objectives in attending the 21<sup>st</sup> World Forum and Symposium Frankfurt-Germany, 2011:

1. Present my research paper on an international conference of agribusiness

2. Join the final round competition of the top 10 best paper finalists competition for the four awards themes.

3. Join the students meeting and agribusiness companies meeting

4. To get new ideas and trend on the agribusiness fields

5. Create a network with researchers and business representatives from all over the world

#### Oral presentation

In the oral presentation I was the first of the section (See Appendix 1). I had 3 judges joining the presentation. The judges considered both the quality of the manuscript and the oral presentation. The judges will be allowed to review the comments made by the reviewers who assessed the written version of the paper. A total of 50 points will be allocated for manuscript quality and another 50 points for the oral presentation. Based upon these final rankings, the Best Paper Review Committee will decided which papers will receive the 2011 Symposium Best paper Award.

## Best paper award ceremony

Best paper award winners receive certificates and plaques during the conference award ceremony. The four categories of the competition was **conference theme**, manuscript reflects the annual conference theme, "The road to 2050: Sustainability as a Business Opportunity." Second, **innovation**: manuscript demonstrates an innovative idea or solution to an agri-agro issue. Third, **relevance to managers**: manuscript presents solutions that are relevant and useful to agribusiness managers or management. And fourth, **communication or marketing**: novel communication or marketing of an idea or product.

My research was awarded best paper winner on innovation theme (See picture in appendix 2). The winners are listed below.
